Dennington Primary

Children from Wren Class enjoyed a fantastic Romans trip to Hands On Heritage at Tunstall Forest. On arrival, they were treated to home-cooked pancakes with honey and apple juice served in Roman numeral cups. The children then stepped into the role of archaeologists, excavating a Roman villa and uncovering artefacts such as broken pots, coins, bones and tesserae (mosaic tiles). These discoveries helped them work out how the different rooms of the villa were used. They also tried hands-on activities from Roman Britain, including whittling wood to make a butter knife, creating pewter jewellery

and weaving wool into cloth. Everyone agreed it was a brilliant and memorable trip. Hands on Heritage said that they had never had "a more interested, curious, knowledgeable and well-mannered group" than the children from Dennington school, which we were very pleased to hear!

Fressingfield Primary

Pupils celebrate regional win at national Fonetti Summer Read-Aloud Challenge awards.

Two pupils travelled to London to collect the East of England Regional Winners trophy at the national Fonetti Summer Read-Aloud Challenge awards ceremony, hosted at Amazon's UK headquarters. Finley and Oliver, were selected to represent their school after Fressingfield Primary was named regional winner for the East of England. They received the trophy on behalf of the school presented by Clare Balding, broadcaster, journalist and ambassador for the summer reading challenge. The achievement follows an outstanding summer of reading for pupils at the school. Eleven children from Fressingfield Primary finished in the top 100 readers across East Anglia, with many children reading more than 50 books and the winner – Finley – reading 114 books in total! The summer reading challenge encourages children to continue reading for pleasure during the school holidays, helping to support literacy, confidence and a lifelong love of books. The challenge takes place using the Fonetti Read-Aloud App, which listens as the children read, supporting with words as necessary. This year's results place Fressingfield Primary among the most engaged schools in the country.



Great Whelnetham Primary

At Great Whelnetham, we are proud to have opened our new 'Zen Den' wellbeing room for both our school and the wider community. This calm and welcoming space offers children the opportunity to spend time individually, in pairs or small groups, providing vital support for pupils experiencing anxiety, emotional or mental health needs, or simply those who need a quiet moment away from the busy school day. The Zen Den has been made possible thanks to the generous support of our local community, including our PTFA and the Tesco

Sure Start scheme. This term, the space will also be used by the local community to host the *Hamish and Milo* Families Together programme, bringing families together each week to share experiences, support one another and strengthen wellbeing across our community.

Hardwick Primary

A group of Year 5 girls from Hardwick Primary School recently enjoyed an inspiring visit to a local secondary school, where they took part in a STEM event designed to encourage girls to explore science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Throughout the day, the pupils worked collaboratively to tackle a range of practical challenges, drawing on their scientific thinking, technological skills and mathematical knowledge. The girls had a fantastic experience, building confidence, teamwork and enthusiasm for STEM subjects.



Honington Primary

Year 5 have enthusiastically begun their Design Technology projects. They have enjoyed exploring a range of pillow designs, investigating different materials and aesthetic features. The children have been learning a variety of sewing techniques including running stitch, back stitch and blanket stitch, and have also had the opportunity to practise applique, attaching buttons and embroidery. The children are looking forward to designing and creating their own pillows.

Ickworth Park Primary

The EYFS team have been pleased to invite parents and carers into school this term to share the fantastic progress Reception children are making in phonics. These sessions gave families the opportunity to see first-hand how phonics is taught and to celebrate the children's growing confidence in recognising sounds, blending and early reading skills. Alongside this, children in Reception have been very busy developing their writing skills. Through a wide range of engaging activities, children have been learning to form letters correctly, write simple words and sentences, and express their ideas with increasing confidence. This focus on early writing is helping the children to develop all the key skills they need to become confident, successful writers as they continue their learning journey.



Occold Primary

Children at Occold Primary School have settled into the new term well. Fox Class have enjoyed reading Shackleton's Journey by William Grill in English. This book has inspired the children to create some wonderful books of their own to house their writing. The children have been writing in role as members of Shackleton's crew on his 1914 Endurance expedition. Their writing includes a job application, diary entry, poem, post card and short persuasive speech - each capturing important moments of the expedition brilliantly. Well done, Fox Class!
